COUNTY LAWS INSPECTORATE, COMPLIANCE AND ENFORCEMENT BILL, 2014

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The Chairperson (Hon. Stephen Kiarie): Thank you honourable Members, we can proceed. I hope each one of you has a copy of the Bill. We are going to start with Clause 3 which has no amendment.

(Question that Clause 3 be part of the Bill put and agreed to)

Hon. Stephen Muiruri: Thank you Mr. Chair, I want to refer to Standing Order 129 which says that if any Member before the conclusion of the proceedings on a Bill in a Committee of the Whole House of the County Assembly moves to report progress on such Motion is carried, the Chairperson shall leave the Chair and the Chairperson or if the Chairperson has taken the Speaker's Chair, the Member in charge of the Bill shall report progress to the Assembly and shall seek leave to sit again and a day for the resumption of the proceedings shall be determined by the House Business Committee in consultation with the Member in charge of the Bill.

Mr. Chair, enforcement Bill is a very important Bill to this County Assembly, and at this point, I want to inform you that we were given this Bill just some few minutes ago, and we want to ask for your indulgence because we want to go through this Bill and also go through the amendment report that is before this House so that we can debate properly and move the several amendments in this Bill.

Hon. Peter Mwangi: Thank you Mr. Chair, the honourable Member is misleading the House because Mr. Chair, three weeks ago I read this Bill for the second time and there were copies for all Members and the Bill has been through public participation since last year, and we met with the authors of the Bill to Matt Farm Hotel; we met with the stakeholders at The Stem Hotel, so just like many other Bills that have been passed through this House, this Bill is not new to the honourable Members but only new to honourable Kuria because he has never attended the meetings and even the day we were reading for the Second Time, he was not present.

Hon. Penina Sortum: (On a point of information) thank you Mr. Chair, I would wish to say that we have a lot of work and at times our brains cannot recall what we read, so I request that you give us time to reread this Bill and that we set another date to sit for this Bill.

The Chairperson (Hon. Stephen Kiarie): Madam Penina you are out of order! So we continue.

Hon. Stephen Muiruri: Let them refer to the Standing Order Mr. Chair. And I am not saying the Bill is bad or we are not aware of it, but what I am saying is that we postpone it and do it at a future date.

The Chairperson (Hon. Stephen Kiarie): Give us time to consult... Order! Order Members! Honourable Steve, can we have your statement again.

Hon. Stephen Muiruri: Thank you Mr. Chair. I am going to refer to the Standing Orders again because this is a House of Rules and Procedures and we as Members of this House we are well aware of our duties in this County Assembly. The Standing Orders say; if any Member before the conclusion of the proceedings on a Bill in a Committee of the Whole House of the County Assembly moves to report progress on such Motion is carried, the Chairperson shall leave the Chair and the Chairperson or if the Chairperson has taken the Speaker's Chair, the Member in charge of the Bill (who is now honourable Palang'a) shall report progress to the Assembly and

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shall seek leave to sit again and a day for the resumption of the proceedings shall be determined by the House Business Committee in consultation with the Member in charge of the Bill.

Simply Mr. Chair what I am asking is you have already started reading the Bill and we have already started proceeding with this Bill, what I am requesting the House is that we postpone proceedings for this Bill and that will create time for these Members to go through it. Enforcement Bill is a very serious Bill Mr. Chair.

(Applause)

The Chairperson (Hon. Stephen Kiarie): Thank honourable Kuria. Do you have enough reasons to postpone this Bill?

Hon. Stephen Muiruri: Yes, Mr. Chair, as I have said the County Inspectorate, Compliance and Enforcement Bill is a Bill that can even be used to hang our people. It has serious consequences and it is very important that we go through it properly and understand it well before it is passed. This is the last stage and we cannot risk going ahead with it without having proper knowledge of it Mr. Chair.

The Chairperson (Hon. Stephen Kiarie): Yes honourable Muriithi.

Hon. Joshua Muriithi: Thank you Mr. Chair, this Bill has gone through all the necessary stages and I do not see why we should not continue.

The Chairperson (Hon. Stephen Kiarie): Yes honourable Palang'a.

Hon. Peter Palang'a: Thank you Mr. Chair, I am actually the sponsor of this Bill and I want to say that whichever direction the House takes, it is also important to note that there are things that require looking and relooking. I have read the mood of the Members and I want to agree with them that this Bill requires more scrutiny. You know Mr. Chair, the essence of this Bill is actually to ensure that there is sanity within our inspectorate team and this cannot be realized without the good will of these Members.

I know the Bill had been read some time back and at some point we debated about it; but because this week in particular has been very busy, and you know when a Member sets his mind to another course, it becomes very difficult to engage or disengage the memory.

The Members have psyched themselves for the KICOSCA Games but I can see they are very willing to support this Bill, but as we speak they have already set their minds for the KICOSCA and the mover... So Mr. Chair I want to end my contribution by saying that as we postpone to another day, if that will be agreeable, Members I will still call upon you to interrogate this Bill, relook Clause by Clause so when it is due, we will not expect some excuses that Members have not had time to read and interrogate it. This Bill is very important and is meant to bring sanity, thank you.

The Chairperson (Hon. Stephen Kiarie): The mood in the House is terrible, what is happening? I propose that we postpone this debate and I will put to question

REPORT

STATEMENT

NATIONAL CEREALS AND PRODUCE BOARD

Hon. Joseph Waithaka: Madam Temporary Speaker, Hon. Beatrice Nyawira sought for a Statement from the Chairperson of the Committee on Agriculture concerning the National Cereals and Produce Board. The requested statement is on the following:

- i. How many buying Centres were opened and where they are located.
- ii. How much maize was bought from each centre?
- iii. How much money has been paid from each centre?
- iv. Why some centres were opened for only two weeks and later closed before all the maize was bought.
- v. Who occupies senior positions in all departments?

Madam Temporary Speaker, in response to this, the Committee did write to the County Executive Committee, Member for Agriculture to forward a statement to the effect. The Chief Officer indicated that the National Cereals and Produce Board is not a devolved unit under his authority therefore he may not get adequate information on the board's management and so he went ahead to seek a report on the sought statement from the board.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Madam Temporary Speaker,

I. The Member of the County Executive Committee for Agriculture noted that there is need to fully devolve the National Produce and Cereals Board to the Agriculture docket so that the County and its residence can benefit from revenue generation, marketing and buying produce from the farmers.

II. If this board is devolved, it will also encourage transparency in all its dealings.

Thank you Madam Temporary Speaker and I beg to rest my case here and proceed to another Statement sought by hon. Florence Njoroge of Elburgon ward, she had sought a statement on a concerning the following.

 - iii. The total monetary allocations for the projects in the mentioned two financial years.

The executives in the Agriculture ministry in response to the committee's letter, attended one of the committee meetings and furnished it with a report on the insights on the above questions as follows:

a. Statement on Farm inputs distribution for 2013/2014 and 2014/2015

FERTILIZER AND SEED DISTRIBUTION 2013-2014.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

The primary objectives of the program are

- I. Improve farm inputs (fertilizer and seeds) access and affordability for smallholder farmers to enhance food security/availability at the household level and,
- II. Generate incomes from sales of surplus produce.
- III. Make the county self-reliant in food supply by generating surplus for our markets from our local farmers

Coverage Area

All the 11 Sub Counties of Nakuru County were targeted (Nakuru West, Nakuru East, Naivasha, Molo, Nakuru North, Kuresoi-North, Kuresoi-South, Njoro, Rongai, Gilgil and Subukia). 11,000 vulnerable farmers were identified and benefited from the program.

Target Beneficiaries

The program targets the very resource poor farmers owning less than 2.5 acres of land. The package is being provided on grant basis with basic inputs to cover at least 1 acre of land.

Packages- For one (1) acre of land

- 50 Kg planting fertilizer (TSP or NPK)
- 10 Kg Hybrid seed maize

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Farmer Responsibilities

- Land preparation
- Planting
- Weeding
- Top dressing
- Harvesting

Weather conditions and their impact on the program**Madam Temporary Speaker,**

The rains started normally and farmers planted maize crops as usual. However, the unexpected dry spell after planting may affect the crop and this may have a negative effect on performance and overall maize yield.

Madam Temporary Speaker,

Madam Temporary Speaker, the issues discussed are as follows:

- Program concepts and objectives
- Identification and recruitment of beneficiaries
- Vetting of beneficiary lists
- Input distribution logistics

Madam Temporary Speaker,

These are the challenges of implementing Farm Input Support Program

1. The initial recruitment had a list of 1500 farmers but this was scaled down to 1000. This was a challenge because the 500 who were finally removed from the list felt denied.
2. The inputs were sometimes centrally stored and the Sub Counties did not have the capacity to transport the inputs. For example in Mau-Summit and Barut where they had to deliver to the wards where the vulnerable farmers are. It was left to the SCAO concerned to ensure the inputs are taken closer to the wards. The vulnerable farmers contributed towards transport of the same
3. Transport constraints were experienced during the entire exercise.
4. There was lack of enough storage facilities in most sub-counties.
5. There were other logistical constraints such as lack of funds for fare refund to members of ward and sub county vetting committees.
6. Impassable roads as rains had already set in especially Molo and Kuresoi South.
7. Most vulnerable farmers do not have title deeds while others lease land.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon Eunice Muriithi): Yes Hon Warothe

Hon Jonathan Warothe: (On point of order) Madam Temporary Speaker, the Standing Orders are very expressive and they provide for 10minutes to each member whether presenting or making a statement, I think he has exceeded that provision and so he is supposed to sum up

The Temporary Speaker (Hon Eunice Muriithi): Yes hon Florence

Hon Florence Njoroge: Thank you Madam Speaker, whether the Standing Orders has given 10 minutes, this is a comprehensive Statement which was sought and cannot be limited by time. However, at the same time, I think the hon Member can try to summarize and then we be given copies of the Statement so that we can go through. This is because seated here, I cannot comprehend from where he started to where we are.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Eunice Muriithi): Yes, hon Wang'ombe

Hon Michael Ngeshu: Thank you Madam Temporary Speaker, this is a House of rules and procedures. The Standing Orders are made so that they can guide the operations of the Assemblies. And in that, hon Warothe was in order to say that we are limited to 10 minutes. I do not know from which other law we are going to apply. I think we follow the rules by giving ten minutes and already the hon Member has exceeded that time limit we can postpone so that he can read the Statement another day.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Eunice Muriithi): Hon Members let us give him a few minutes

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Hon Joseph Waithaka: It is worth noting that I am responding to three requests. If one request for Statement is taking 10 minutes then I should be allowed to take 30 minutes or otherwise I reply to one Statement and sit, and then House Business Committee reschedules for replying to the other Statements some other time.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon Eunice Muriithi): How many have you replied now?"

Hon Jonathan Warothe: Madam Temporary Speaker the procedure is; we are supposed to have copies of what he is reading. So that he can sum up, we are not understanding it, it is as if he is lecturing to us

Hon Joseph Waithaka: It is not me to provide copies; I only have my copy which I am presenting. May be copies are put at the pigeon holes. It is a prerogative of the parliamentary orderlies' to put copies on the pigeon holes.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon Eunice Muriithi): Honorable Members get seated and I will ask the Honorable Member to sum up on the presentation that he is making. Again we have a problem with photocopier that is why it was not possible to have you furnished with the copies of the Statement but ones they are done, they will be put on your pigeon holes. However, I know there is a lot of anxiety to get out of here so that you can go do your sports practice, so kindly Honorable Member, try to summarize your presentation

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Madam Temporary Speaker, This is the explanation on delays in distribution of the Farm Inputs for both Financial Years (2013/2014 and 2014/2015), how it was distributed and the criteria used in identifying areas where the projects were to be implemented.

The issue of delays in the distribution of farm inputs is occasioned by two major factors;

1. Slow funds disbursement from the Treasury department

Majority of the biggest suppliers such as Kenya Seeds, NCPB, MEA Ltd, Egerton University etc. would prefer a payment system in which their goods/services are paid up-front even as they supply the inputs. For this FY (2014/15) they have already supplied our department with the requisite goods/services but are yet to be paid for the same. This does not auger well for our department in future.

2. Failure to disburse funds as per the budget.

This Financial year initially a total of **Kshs 8.1M** was allocated for rehabilitation of cattle-dips but eventually **Kshs 7.1M** was disbursed for the same.

b. How the CEC-Agriculture distributed financial resources meant for revival of cattle-dips for the two Financial Years.

Procedurally there are grass-root meetings/Forum organized by County Government through the Treasury where members of the public are invited to present and discuss their projects proposals for up-take by the departments. These projects eventually are included in the development projects for the department.

c. Criteria used to identify the areas where projects would be implemented

For 2013/14 Financial year, the County Assembly committees submitted the names of cattle-dips to be rehabilitated but during the 2014/15 financial year the prevalence of Tick-borne diseases as per our statistics/records was used as the priority criteria

Madam Speaker, the total monetary allocations for the two financial years are as follows:

BUDGET IMPLEMENTATION REPORT FOR FINANCIAL YEAR 2013-2014

During the Financial Year 2013/14, our ministry received the following funds;

- I. Recurrent Expenditure: **Kshs 75,498,320** was allocated, however **Kshs33, 715,059** was disbursed. The disbursed funds amount was 44.65% of the allocated funds.

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- II. Development Expenditure: **Kshs 85,700,000** was allocated and **Kshs80, 700,000** was disbursed. This is approximately 94, 15% of the allocated funds. Out of these **Kshs 64,500,000** (Kshs **48.0M** for fertilizers and Kshs **16.5M**) to buy seeds). Cattle dips rehabilitation spent **Kshs 10.0M**
